Background and Class Environmental Assessment Study

In September 2011, the Region of Waterloo (Region) completed the Biosolids Master Plan Update that established a centralized biosolids heat drying facility utilizing waste energy as the preferred technology for managing its biosolids up to 2041. As the next step, in October 2012, the Region initiated a Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) study to identify the preferred site for the new heat drying facility. This Class EA study is being conducted according to the requirements of a Schedule B project of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment document (Municipal Engineers Association, October 2000 as amended in 2007 & 2011).

After creating a long list of potential sites for the new facility, they were screened and two sites were short-listed:

- Cambridge Waste Management Centre located at 201 Savage Drive in Cambridge, and
- Waterloo Region Emergency Services Training and Research Complex, WRESTRC (located 1005 Erb Street West, on the west side of the Waterloo Waste Management Centre).

Public Information Centres (PIC) were held on December 5 and 11, 2012 in Cambridge and Waterloo, respectively, to introduce the project, the two potential sites, and the evaluation methodology to recommend a preferred site.

Both sites have now been subjected to a comparative evaluation based on technical/natural environment impacts, social/community impacts, financial impacts, and impact mitigation measures. The Cambridge Waste Management Centre is the preliminary recommended site for the new facility.

Your Opinion Matters

Public consultation is a key component of this Class EA study. A second round of Public Information Centres is planned to present the evaluation results and the recommended site, the next steps in the process, and obtain your feedback. The second Public Information Centres will be held:

Waterline repairs needed at Byng Island

The opening of Byng Island Conservation Area will be delayed because of a broken waterline that crosses under the Grand River from Dunnville.

The 30-year-old line supplies the park with municipal drinking water. The break was discovered in December and a report in March confirmed that it is not possible to repair the existing line, so a new permanent solution is needed.

The GRCA is considering a variety of options for restoring the permanent water supply but none of these will be ready for the park opening. In the interim the GRCA will be investigating temporary water supply options in an effort to minimize service disruptions.

Opening day for conservation areas in the Grand River watershed is May 1, but earlier this spring the GRCA announced a plan to delay opening Byng Island until May 15 so that staff can explore solutions. Campsite reservations at Byng are not being accepted until after May 31 and seasonal campers have been told about the delay.

After the park opens, there may be disruptions in the water supply to the park and some facilities may be closed until the upgrades are completed. Any disruptions will be posted online in the GRCA newsroom.

Cool dry March

March was drier and cooler than the long-term average, resulting in good maple syrup weather.

Precipitation by March 19 was about half the long-term average, following on the heels of a wet February. During that time the temperature was slightly below the long-term average at Shand Dam.

River flows were high in March due to runoff from snow melt. Most of the ice on the rivers had moved out during the second week of March when temperatures rose. A flood warning was issued March 11 for Ayr and a water safety message was issued for the Easter long weekend at the end of the month due to increasing river levels.

At the end of the month, major reservoirs had approximately 40 per cent to 50 per cent of their flood storage space available and were being operated to reduce downstream river flows. Groundwater levels were increasing in aquifers at monitoring wells near Mill Creek and Whitemans Creek. Rivers were expected to remain high during the early part of April.

Conestogo wetland project

Improvements will be made to berms and other control features of wetlands within Conestogo Lake Conservation Area.

The area has three impoundment wetlands that were created in the 1980s on 7.5 hectares of land. These will be retrofitted with water control structures so that water levels can be controlled. Work is expected to begin this month, with other work to take place in August.

Most of the \$110,000 cost of the work is being paid for by donations from a variety of environmental groups, including the Grand River Conservation Foundation (\$23,700), Wildlife Habitat Canada (\$45,000), Ducks Unlimited Canada (\$26,000), the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (\$7,000) and Wellington Water Stewardship Program (\$8,000).

Grants available for environmental projects

Applications are now being accepted from community groups and schools for Community Conservation Grants given out by the Grand River Conservation Foundation and the Grand River Conservation Authority.

Grants of up to \$1,000 are awarded to qualified groups (i.e. a registered charity), or up to \$750 for elementary schools, undertaking conservation projects in communities throughout the Grand River watershed. Eligible projects must be tangible and available for the use or benefit of the entire communi-

4.2 <u>Line 9 Oil Pipeline</u>

Ken Hall provided a PowerPoint presentation. Ken Hall indicated that Enbridge has further heightened the importance of their pipeline and facility integrity program and they have re-organized and enhanced the functional areas that are responsible for pipeline and facility integrity.

In recent months, Enbridge has run several in-line tools on the Line 9B pipeline to gather thorough, current data on the condition of the pipeline. Enbridge will undertake all work required to ensure that Line 9 continues to operate safely. Enbridge will be sharing dig program information with Municipalities where integrity digs are scheduled.

Enbridge takes its environmental responsibility very seriously and has programs in place to monitor performance and compliance with regulatory requirements.

HCA staff were invited to attend integrity dig sites for a "work in progress" review. Staff will remain in contact with Enbridge to review their emergency response protocols.

Ken Hall answered Board members questions. Brian McHattie thanked Ken Hall and the Enbridge staff for attending the Board meeting.

A protocol was established between the Haudenosaunee and HCA in November 2011. The Haudenosaunee harvested 31 deer in 2011/2012 and 37 deer in 2012/2013.

Paul Williams indicated that the Haudenosaunee will be working closely with HCA and MNR to begin discussions on a joint initiative in regards to learning, sharing, and teaching with respect to ongoing evaluation of the deer in the valley and their impacts upon the ecosystem utilizing traditional Haudenosaunee knowledge and ecological science based methods.
