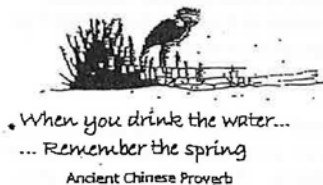

Dear Mayor Lever, Councilors, Ms Landry and Ms Tremblay,

The Mill Creek Subwatershed Community Liaison Team (CLT) appreciates the opportunity to provide the Township of Puslinch with information in respect to the CLT's financial resources and the use of the Alf Hales Room for a 2-hour meeting each month. The CLT is very grateful that the Township of Puslinch has waived fees and provided us with a place to meet at the Township of Puslinch Community Centre at no cost.

The Mill Creek Subwatershed Community Liaison Team was established in 1994 as a public consultation group for the Mill Creek Subwatershed Study, undertaken and funded by five municipalities, the Grand River Conservation Authority, the Ministry of the Environment and the Ministry of Natural Resources. The CLT continues to meet monthly at the Township of Puslinch Community Centre to discuss issues that relate to water and natural heritage resources, land use development proposals and human health and safety issues. Please see attached Agendas for the past four CLT meetings, listing reports and discussions that took place.

Since its inception, the CLT has attended many meetings, workshops and seminars sponsored by local municipalities, the Province of Ontario and the Grand River Conservation Authority. The CLT has prepared and submitted written comments in respect to planning and licensing applications, Permit To Take Water applications, municipal and provincial government initiatives, proposed legislation, policies and guidelines. A number of CLT written comments can be accessed on the EBR Registry (e.g. #011-0248; #011-6340; #155488; #011-5746).

During the Walkerton Inquiry, the CLT made a presentation before Justice O'Connor, stressing the need for public notification, consultation and participation to protect the quality and quantity

of ground water and surface water, source water wellhead areas and drinking water supplies, both in rural and urban settings. Each year, the CLT organizes a booth at the Aberfoyle Fall Fair to promote the regular testing of water in local wells and to provide various educational and informational materials.

This year, 2014, marks the 20th year of the founding of the Mill Creek Subwatershed Community Liaison Team. Through the years, the CLT's membership has grown considerably less, as some people moved away or could no longer participate for various reasons. The CLT was once very strong with the leadership of two of our original founders, Harry Lawry and Professor Stan Collins, who remain in our memories as two very able and unrelenting defenders of the Mill Creek Subwatershed. The CLT now holds its meetings in the afternoon so that night driving is no longer a concern for its members. The Mill Creek Subwatershed Community Liaison Team has continued to exist as a committed and long-standing subwatershed community group in the Grand River Watershed and our plans are to carry on with our commenting and advocacy work in the immediate future and for the long term.


As members of the CLT have always generously volunteered their time and contributed in any way they can, there has been no necessity to collect monies or to prepare and submit financial statements or operating budgets. The CLT has never considered it necessary to approach the Township of Puslinch to make a request for a grant to assist in carrying out a particular project or program in the community. The CLT has no financial assets.

Please find attached an excerpt from Section 2.2 "*Consultation Activities*" of the Mill Creek Subwatershed Plan, 1996 which provides background historical information about the formation and establishment of the Mill Creek Subwatershed Community Liaison Team and its formative goals and objectives. This history serves as a fine example of how public consultation and public participation approaches were coming into acceptable practice and taking shape in the Province of Ontario and our local municipalities nearing the end of the 20th Century.

In closing, the Mill Creek Subwatershed Community Liaison Team respectfully requests that the Township of Puslinch consider allowing the CLT to meet on the second last Thursday afternoon of each month (January to November) from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Alf Hales Room without cost. SECTION 2: PUBLIC CONSULTATION APPROACH

SUBSECTION 2.2 CONSULTATION ACTIVITIES, Pages 2 and 3

The Mill Creek Subwatershed Study public consultation approach evolved (and continues to) over the course of the study. Major consultation-related activities undertaken are summarized below.

- Advertisements announcing the initiation of the Mill creek Subwatershed Study and the creation of a study mailing list were placed in several local newspapers. Individual announcements were mailed to all Township of Puslinch subwatershed residents.
- A study newsletter, summarizing key findings of the Background Report and announcing the first Open House/Issues Roundtable, was forwarded to the study's mailing list members in June, 1994.
- A public Open House/Issues Roundtable was held at the Puslinch community Centre in July, 1994 to present findings from the study's Background Report and elicit community issues. Many issues and concerns were outlined and recorded. A major issue concerned the public's interest in developing their own terms of reference for the study's public consultation component.
- In September of 1994, a community meeting was held where the concept of a *Community Liaison Team* (CLT) was conceived. Two members of the CLT (membership to revolve) were appointed to the Study's Technical Committee.
- In November of 1994, the CLT developed a subwatershed vision and an ongoing, operational terms of reference or mandate. The CLT's mandate, as developed by the team, was to:
 - review and provide comment on the study's technical components as they are provided;
 - provide recommendations to the study team the CLT is willing to support;
 - educate the public and bureaucracy on study progress/findings;
 - actively participate in study rehabilitation and implementation activities- environmentally and politically.
- CLT meetings were held twice monthly from November , 1994 to May 1995, monthly from June, 1995 to August, 1995, and twice monthly from September to December, 1995. Meetings became self-facilitating, at the CLT's request, in February, 1995. CLT meeting agendas were based on the informational requirements identified by the CLT and included presentations/discussions on:
 - Subwatershed Geology/Hydrogeology;
 - Subwatershed Hydrology;
 - Lower Mill creek Hydrology (i.e. through Cambridge);
 - Mill Creek Aquatic Environment/Restoration Projects;
 - Subwatershed Modelling Approach;
 - Aggregate Issues/Tour;
 - Local Development Proposals/Agency Review Process;
 - Private Property Rights/Environmental Designations;

- Proposed Greenspace System;
 - Mill Creek Subwatershed Flyover;
 - Laurel Creek Watershed Implementation issues
- CLT members were encouraged to document local environmental and social histories for the benefit of other CLT members, the client, and consultants.
 - A combined consultant/CLT team organized and implemented the “*Mill Creek Days*” at the Aberfoyle Public School during April, 1995. This one- week event focused on interactive activities designed to promote understanding and local stewardship of mill creek Subwatershed resources among students, teachers and parents.
 - A “*Walk’n Talk*” landowner visitation program was undertaken by the client, consultant and CLT members. Interested property owners were encouraged to share their knowledge and views of subwatershed ecology and issues with study team members through guided walking tours of their properties.
 - CLT and consultant team members co-staffed a subwatershed study display booth at the Aberfoyle Fall fair in September, 1995.
 - Most CLT meetings were recorded on video and are available from the University of Guelph’s Ontario Public Interest Research Group’s Office (OPIRG).

SUBSECTION 2.6 COMMUNITY LIAISON TEAM VISION

Through consensus, the CLT adopted the following as its vision for the Mill Creek Subwatershed:

In the short term, to leave the subwatershed in a better state for the next generation.

In the long term, to return Mill Creek and all its tributaries back to a functional (natural) cold-water system in a natural (beautiful) landscape.

In my 2012/2013 Annual Report that was just tabled before the Ontario legislature, I warn that Ontario's environmental protections are being deliberately dismantled. These changes are regressive and pose significant ecological risks to our province.

The Ministry of Natural Resources is walking away from many parts of its job to safeguard wildlife and our natural resources. It's being done under the guise of what's called "MNR transformation."

Profound changes were made to many different environmental laws in Bill 55, last year's budget bill of the Ontario government. There was no public consultation on these sweeping changes.

MNR is responsible for planning, management, and enforcement on all Crown lands in Ontario, which make up 87% of our province. These are our public lands and MNR is trusted to look after them on our behalf. A law called the *Public Lands Act* was changed in Bill 55 to let MNR shed any of this responsibility. Anyone else, including a private multinational corporation, could now be allowed to do as they please with our lands.

2(3) In addition to the authority given the Minister to delegate powers to an employee of the ministry under section 7 of the Ministry of Natural Resources Act, the Minister may delegate any of his or her powers under this Act that are prescribed by regulation to a person or body prescribed by the regulations, subject to the limitations prescribed by the regulations.

The *Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act* is the law that MNR uses for the planning, management, and enforcement for wildlife management in Ontario. It was similarly changed in Bill 55. Now, these powers could be turned over to anyone, including someone or something that may not have our best interests or that of wildlife in mind.

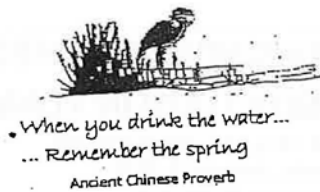
60.1(1) In addition to the authority given to the Minister to delegate powers to an employee of the Ministry under section 7 of the Ministry of Natural Resources Act, the Minister may delegate the following powers to a person or body prescribed by the regulations:

(a) the power to issue licences under section 60; and

(b) any power granted to the Minister under this Act to authorize an activity that would otherwise be prohibited under this Act, other than an authorization to issue licences under section 61.

These changes beg the questions: why and for whom?

And as I ask in my Annual Report, why were these changes shielded from public scrutiny and the public's right to comment taken away? These are our lands and our wildlife. Without the public service looking after our interests we risk having a nightmare scenario in our province, and that it is what I fear the most.

Ontario's EBR Turns 20: Time for Change

A number of key milestones will occur in 2014, including: the 100th anniversary of the start of World War One; the 30th anniversary of the Bhopal chemical disaster in India; and the 10th anniversary of the launch of Facebook.

2014 will also mark the 20th anniversary of the date (February 1994) when Ontario's ground-breaking *Environmental Bill of Rights* ^[1] (EBR) was proclaimed into force.

Over the past two decades, CELA, environmental groups and concerned residents across the province have used the EBR to help protect the environment, enhance public participation in decision-making, and ensure governmental accountability.

While there have been a number of success stories under the legislation (such as the precedent-setting Lafarge case ^[2]), it has been increasingly apparent to CELA and other observers that the EBR needs to be updated and strengthened in order to better achieve these important goals.

In 2010, CELA filed an Application for Review of the EBR ^[3] which identified ten issues which required further improvements and statutory amendments. In 2011, the Ministry of the Environment (MOE) agreed that CELA's requested review of the EBR would be undertaken in conjunction with a similar review requested by Ecojustice.

As noted by the Environmental Commissioner in his 2010-11 Annual Report ^[4] (pages 116-19), the MOE's proposed review offers an important opportunity to engage Ontarians in updating and renewing the EBR.

Having agreed to conduct the requested EBR review, it now unfortunately appears that the MOE's review of the EBR is occurring at a glacial pace behind closed doors, and that no meaningful steps have been made to engage the public on this important matter.

In October 2012, CELA and other environmental organizations wrote to the Environment Minister to object to the inordinate delay in the EBR review, and to request meaningful opportunities for the public to participate in the EBR review. However, it appears that no tangible progress has been made to date in the EBR review.



In CELA's view, the continuing refusal of the MOE to engage stakeholders in the EBR review is objectionable, unjustified and highly ironic in light of the EBR's objective of ensuring public participation in environmental decision-making.

It is also noteworthy that the three year timeframe taken so far by the MOE just to get the focused EBR review underway greatly exceeds the amount of time (ten months) taken by the EBR Task Force to originally draft the EBR in its entirety (September 1991 to July 1992).

In late 2013, CELA again wrote ^[5] to the Environment Minister to request that the MOE take all necessary steps to expedite the EBR review and to provide meaningful public participation opportunities in this process.

In our view, this collaborative approach must be taken before the MOE makes any final decisions on the outcome of the EBR review. Moreover, these long overdue steps should be taken (or least publicly announced) by the MOE prior to the EBR's 20th anniversary.

As a long-time advocate of the EBR, CELA concludes that the overarching public interest priority is to ensure that the EBR is appropriately revised so that the legislation will continue to provide effective and enforceable legal tools to address the environmental challenges of the 21st century.
