Who is Ontario Barn Preservation?

- Non-profit dedicated to finding ways to save
 Ontario's dwindling number of old barns
- Formed in 2019, not long before pandemic, so our Board has always met virtually on ZOOM
- 90 members across Ontario
- OBP defines 'old' as built before 1961

Why Save Old Barns?

- Economic potential: All barns have potential for on-farm markets; agri-tainment; dwellings
- Tourism: Weddings/special events; drives to rural destinations aren't the same without barns
- Historic value: Barns often the oldest & largest surviving buildings in rural areas
- Environmentally sustainable: Reuse & recycle
- Every barn tells a story: I can tell you plenty!

1891 Census: Ontario had 441,885 Barns & Stables We have lost perhaps 80-90% ... we just don't know



- OBP creating 2026 document on several options for Municipalities to consider; draft is 20 pages
- Saving physically/digitally; in whole/in part
- Every situation is uniquely different
 - Preservation; designation; conversion; reuse; digital saving for future barn lovers, historians & researchers



Several ways to save old barns



- Preservation is the preferred saving option, but repairs can be expensive & may not be an option
- Conversion usually adds value to barns & makes them more likely to 'pay their way to preservation'
 - Eg. offices, homes, markets, value-added agribusiness
- Reuse means valuable structural components & wood materials are reclaimed & recycled

• Digital saving is an option for every barn, from ones in bad shape to ones in perfect shape; OBP's 'Your Old Barn Study' (YOBS) shows owners how to enter data about their barns into a secure database housed by U of Guelph, to save their barns in the virtual world for future historians, researchers & barn lovers ... a legacy project to honour the past





- Designation can be controversial for barn owners, most who are farmers & do not like restrictions on what they can, or can't do, on their own farms
- OBP is neutral on designation: advocating for informed, case-by-case decisions, but <u>never</u> against the will of a barn owner
- OBP can assist barn owners who want to designate

- Provincial & municipality policies have tremendous influence on the saving of old barns
- PPS; surplus dwelling farm severances; zoning; agritourism; taxes/assessments; MDS; building codes
- Proposed "rain taxes" in some municipalities will be tragic; proposed storm water management fees on impervious surfaces such as barn roofs will convince many barn owners to tear down beautiful barns

The purpose of this report is to seek a recommendation from the Committee for how to proceed with the designation recommendations for the aforementioned property.

Dear Ms. Brotherson:

As property co-owners, we are writing to formally express our objection to the proposed heritage designation of the property located at 7704 Wellington Rd. 36, Puslinch, ON NOB 2J0 ("property") under the *Ontario Heritage Act*, as outlined in the Township of Puslinch's ("township") letter dated October 8, 2025, and further to our October 28, 2025 meeting with township staff Laura Emery and Sarah Huether.

In its October 28, 2025 letter, the township identifies the following heritage attributes of the property to be protected by a heritage designation by-law:

Design Value:

- original doors and windows
- original foundation
- stone used for exterior wall
- height, scale, and massing of the original one and a half storey "Ontario House" style

Historical/Associative Value:

- continuous ownership of property by McLean family

Contextual Value:

- shared architectural style ("Ontario House") with other properties

Grounds for objection:

While the township's commitment to community preservation is appreciated, we respectfully submit that the proposed designation is not appropriate for this property for the following collective reasons:

Design Value:

The proposed designation fails to appropriately assess the existing conditions of the property, and attributes undue significance to its design value ("Ontario House") when in fact the Ontario House was relatively generic for its time, and not unique in style, design, or materials used.

Research indicates that the Ontario House style does not meet typical criteria for architectural significance. As a building type the Ontario House is a common, derivative vernacular form without coherent, original stylistic form, rarity or innovation ("The Ontario cottage: the globalization of a British form in the nineteenth century"; Ontario Architectural Guide). The Ontario House style is widespread and ordinary; hence its commonness reduces claims of architectural importance.

In terms of materials, the brick was previously sandblasted causing spalling and increased porousness, reducing the masonry to average/fair condition. The foundation can best be described as average/fair. The windows and front door are not original, having been replaced by more modern building materials. The original roof cladding has been replaced with a steel/metal roof. The front and rear porches are not original to the house. Please refer to the attached photos per Exhibit A, Exhibit B, and Exhibit C.

The noted loss of integrity and altered condition (lack of original features) weakens any claim for architectural distinction and thus historic designation.

Historical/Associative Value:

Long continuous McLean family ownership should not be sufficient basis for proposed heritage designation. The absence of a recognized major historical event occurring at/in this house, and the absence of property ownership by a highly influential public figure supports the position that mere continuous ownership is not enough to warrant heritage designation.

The township's position that continuous ownership of the property supports heritage designation is also diminished given the existing house is not the original house on the property; thus, any suggested community attributes associated with the McLean family's immigration would be, *if at all*, more appropriately attributed to the original house that was built 60+ years prior to construction of the present house.

Families that have owned and cared for a property for generations reasonably expect to hold normal property rights. Imposing heritage designation after 140+ years of the McLean family's ownership of the present house can be perceived as uncompensated regulatory burden - a defacto restriction on use or value that can increase repair and maintenance costs, insurance complexities and costs, and administrative burden.

As a result of the township's current inclusion of this property as a non-designated property on its municipal heritage registry, the property's insurance costs have increased 50% effective September 2024 due to refusal of insurance companies to insure "heritage properties", thereby requiring procurement of property insurance through a willing vendor at the noted higher cost.

Township staff indicated that the township does not offer a property tax offset on heritage designated properties, nor does it currently have a renovation grant program in place.

Further, under current McLean family ownership there are no plans to change use of the property from that of its current use.

Contextual Value:

As conveyed in the objection re: Design Value criteria, the Ontario House style is not unique in design, style, materials, nor in the number of houses constructed in this style.

Given the loss of integrity and altered condition (brick and foundation, the lack of original features (windows, front door, roofing cladding) and non-original front and back porch additions), the suggested contextual value in support of heritage designation is insufficient.

Relief sought:

It is respectfully requested that based on the noted objections, the township reconsider the proposed heritage designation of this property under the *Ontario Heritage Act*, thus excluding it from inclusion in a heritage designation by-law, and also removing it as a non-designated heritage property on the municipal heritage registry.



<u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of this report is to provide the Heritage Advisory Committee with an update regarding the status of properties included on the Township's Heritage Register, number of properties withdrawn from the Township's Heritage Register during the designation process, as well as status updates on Heritage Permits and the Heritage Plaque Program.

Background

At the September 9, 2024 Heritage Advisory Committee meeting the Committee requested an annual fulsome report on what the Committee and staff have accomplished since the beginning of the Heritage Advisory Committee's term in January 2023. This report includes data from January 2023 to November 2025.

Comments

General Heritage Designation Update

The Heritage Advisory Committee is currently working on editing the 2026 Part II Statements of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest (Statements). The associated timelines with this batch of Statements are included in Report HER-2025-020.

The Committee approved the 2026 Part I Priority Properties and Statements at their September 8th, 2025, Committee meeting and the following timelines associated with these properties are below:

Heritage Register Update

There are currently 105 properties listed on the Township's Heritage Register, with 42 having designated status.

In December of 2024, there were 108 properties listed on the Township's Heritage Register with 15 properties having designated status. Three properties have been withdrawn from the Heritage Register in the last year – 6714 Concession 1, 4048 Sideroad 20 South, 86 Farnham Road. The Heritage Register is attached as Schedule "A" to this report.

There are 0 properties remaining on the Township's Heritage Register for the Committee's consideration for recommendation to Council.

Heritage Permit Update

As of the date the agenda is published, staff have not received any Heritage Permit applications.

Heritage Plaque Program Update

At the November 19, 2025 Council meeting, the Heritage Plaque Policy was approved by Council with an annual base budget operating request of \$2,300 being approved to fund the Program annually. The Heritage Plaque Program Policy is attached as Schedule B to this report.

Title: Heritage Plaque Program Policy (Policy)

Policy No. 2025-009

Adoption: November 19, 2025 by Council Resolution No. XXXX-XXX

Subject: Heritage Plaque Program Policy

1. Introduction

1.1. The Township of Puslinch (Township) is committed to recognizing and celebrating properties that are designated in accordance with the *Ontario Heritage Act, 1990* (Act) through the plaquing of designated properties.

2. Purpose

2.1. This Policy provides a consistent and transparent framework for the plaquing of designated properties within the Township.

3. Policy Scope

- 3.1. The Township Policy applies to all applications submitted under the Heritage Plaque Program (Program) and identifies the Township's role in supporting and administering the program. The Program provides designated property owners with the opportunity for a customized heritage plaque that recognizes the architectural, cultural and historical resources that contribute to the character of Puslinch. This Policy is distinct from, and does not have the cause or effect of, a designation process under the Act.
- 3.2. This Policy only applies to properties that are designated under the Act, and where the property owner makes a request for a plaque. The Policy sets out the criteria surrounding eligibility and access to the Program.

4. Definitions

- 4.1. For the purpose of this policy, unless otherwise stated, the following definitions shall apply:
 - 4.1.1. "Act" means the *Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O 1990, C.O. 18*, as amended from time to time; and all definitions included therein;



- 4.1.2. "Applicant" means the legal owner of a property and includes a person authorized in writing to act on behalf of the owner of the property to apply for a Plaque;
- 4.1.3. "Application" means a written submission to request a plaque, in a form prescribed by the Township.
- 4.1.4. "Building" means the building with the heritage attributes as set out in the description of the property in the designation by-law;
- 4.1.5. "Committee" means the Township of Puslinch Heritage Advisory Committee;
- 4.1.6. "Designated Property" means real property in the Township of Puslinch, including all buildings structures, and other features thereon, that has been designated under Part IV of the *Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O 1990, C.O. 18*, or is subject to a Notice of Intention to Designate under Section 29 of part IV of the Act, for having cultural heritage value or interest;
- 4.1.7. "Director" means the Director of Corporate Services/Municipal Clerk of the Township, or anyone designated by the Director of Corporate Services/Municipal Clerk to perform his or her duties relating to this policy;
- 4.1.8. Heritage Attribute(s): The Heritage Attributes as set out in the description of the property's in the designation by-law;
- 4.1.9. Maintenance: The preservation and upkeep of the plaque to prevent excessive damage or fading;
- 4.1.10. Property Owner: The person registered on title in the proper land registry office as the owner of the property.

5. Program Description and Eligibility

- 5.1.1. The Program provides an opportunity to increase the sense of community and identify the rich built heritage in the Township through the recognition of the architectural cultural and historical resources that contribute to the character of Puslinch.
- 5.1.2. Only property owners designated under Part IV of the Act are eligible for a plaque under the Program.
- 5.1.3. This program is provided at no cost to eligible property owners.
- 5.1.4. Designated properties in tax arrears with the Township or properties which have outstanding by-law enforcement violations will be deemed ineligible to receive a plaque until all taxes are paid and the property is in compliance with the applicable Township by-law.



6. Plaquing Process Application

- 6.1. Applicants submit an online Application Form to the Director using the prescribed form, which may be amended by the Director from time to time. Information required for the application may include but is not limited to:
 - 6.1.1. Name of Property Owner;
 - 6.1.2. Address of designated property;
 - 6.1.3. Owner Contact Information;
 - 6.1.4. Confirmation of the request for a Heritage Plaque;
 - 6.1.5. Agreement to the Terms and Conditions of Plaque installation (e.g. responsibility for maintenance, timeline for replacement, etc.).
- 6.2. Applications will be accepted year-round and may be submitted at any time.
- 6.3. Applications will be considered on a first-come-first-serve basis with a limit of 10 plaques issued per calendar year.
- 6.4. Should the Township receive more than 10 plaque requests in a calendar year, applications will be carried forward and issued in the order in which applications are received in the next calendar year.
- 6.5. The Director or their designate is responsible for administrating the Program, including coordination the ordering and installation of the plaques.

7. Design Criteria and Composition of Plaques

- 7.1. All plaques will include information regarding:
 - 7.1.1. The name of the property owner to be included on the plaque;
 - 7.1.2. The year that the property was developed;
 - 7.1.3. The original use of the building or the occupation of the first owner;
- 7.2. The information displayed on the plaque will be presented as standalone text and shall not include additional information .
- 7.3. A plaque shall be composed in accordance with the following requirements (an illustration is provided below as Figure 1):
 - 7.3.1. Approximately 11 inches high and 18 inches wide;
 - 7.3.2. Text shall be navy blue in accordance with the Township of Puslinch Design Guidelines and in standard font and format;
 - 7.3.3. Background shall be white;



- 7.3.4. Mitered edge shall be navy blue in accordance with the Township of Puslinch Design Guidelines; and
- 7.3.5. Township logo shall be placed in the bottom right hand corner;
- 7.3.6. On Aluminum Composite Panel.



- 7.4. The initial installation of the plaque is the responsibility of the Township. Any subsequent upkeep or maintenance is the responsibility of the owner, including alerting Township staff when replacement of a plaque is required. Plaques are not eligible for replacement for a period of 15 years, except as determined by staff on a case-by-case basis in extenuating circumstances.
- 7.5. The plaque must be visible for pedestrians (where appropriate) and not obscure, detract from, or cause damage to any heritage attributes.
- 7.6. Upon satisfactory verification of the background details and application approval, staff shall notify the owner/applicant in writing within 10 business days if the plaque has been approved. Staff will arrange for the ordering and coordination of the plaque installation by staff or an approved vendor.

8. Review Schedule

8.1. The Program and Policy shall be reviewed every five years as set out in the Township's Corporate Workplan in consultation with the Committee.
